### Turn 5,598 To Zero

5,598: the staggering number of children who were abused in Tarrant County last year. That number suggests that between the time you wake up in the morning to the moment you arrive at work, another child in Tarrant County has been hurt.

And these are just the cases that Tarrant County investigators could prove.

However, that number has been steadily decreasing thanks to The Parenting Center's efforts and those of the community. Across the nation, community involvement has led to lower child abuse rates. April is honored as National Child Abuse Prevention Month so that you can help make the number 5,598 turn to zero.

- Get involved - Ask your community leaders, clergy, library and schools to develop services to meet the needs of healthy children and families.
- Help to develop parenting resources at your local library - Find out whether your local library has parenting resources, and if it does not, offer to help obtain some.
- Improve your communication with your child - Actively listening and showing your deep concern builds trust with your children. Establish and keep a consistent daily time to talk with them, not 'at' them.
- Help yourself - when the big and little problems of your everyday life pile up to the point you feel overwhelmed and out of control, take time out. Don't take it out on your child.
- Volunteer and financially support organizations that fight the tragedy of child abuse.
- Ask that schools and organizations in your community establish child abuse prevention policies.
- Support legislation that protects children.

Nothing is more important than keeping our children safe and happy. As grandparents, parents, aunts, uncles, teachers, coaches, and neighbors, we're called in our desire to find solutions that will keep the kids we love safe.

This past year, The Parenting Center helped 3,570 children and their parents and caregivers to lead them out of abusive situations and into healthy ones. We're grateful for the support of our community, of course, and most importantly, hope for a better life...hope to end the harmful cycle of abuse.

Here are two examples of this hope in action at The Parenting Center:

- A mother came to The Parenting Center and wanted to sign up to be a volunteer. This wasn't her first visit to The Parenting Center as she was a recipient of services 12 years ago. She had been a victim of child abuse and had been helped by a volunteer at The Parenting Center so that she can help other families who are experiencing child abuse.
- A couple expecting their first child came to The Parenting Center for help. The fetus-to-be grew up in an abusive family and wanted to learn successful parenting skills. The couple attended classes and learned how to care for their child. They became parents into the world at the end of 2012.

Two children whose parents were in a drug court for eight years came to The Parenting Center for help. The parents completed the program and graduated from the court into recovery. The Parenting Center helped the parents for a couple of hours and helped them reach an agreement on the litigation could and would be filed against the parents' employer.

With 3,734 children receiving assistance from The Parenting Center in 2012, each child has his or her own story of the impact The Parenting Center has had on them and their family. We know The Parenting Center makes a difference in the lives of children and families.

It takes all of us working together to prevent child abuse in our community. The families and individuals who come to us for help may have experienced child abuse, neglect, or other factors that inhibit their ability to build strong family bonds. These families have little or no access to prevention and intervention resources.

1,146 attended trainings to help address marital illness or other life circumstances. 77% of adults achieved at least 60% of their goals.

1,032 received relationship enhancement skills offered by the Strengthening Families Project. 80% of adults reported increased marital satisfaction, improved communication and conflict resolution skills.

Children in the 24 months of the Parenting Center's intervention demonstrated significant improvement in interpersonal strengths, self-control and attachment.
